RENOWNED adventurer Kingsley Holgate has promised to take the message that children are "sick and tired" of what is happening to southern Africa's rhinos to the world.

Thousands of drawings and messages — created by children in South Africa, Mozambique and Swaziland as part of the Rhino Art: Let the Children's Voices be Heard project — will be handed over to the United Nations and Cites (the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species).

Speaking at the unveiling of a giant rhino horn installation, covered in the children's art, at King Shaka International Airport yesterday, Holgate said his decision to hear what the youth had to say was born out of his recent Izintaba Zobombo expedition.

He and his team travelled the length of the Lubombo range of mountains, to the Kruger National Park and nearby private reserves, along the border with Mozambique, to the Parque Nacional do Limpopo and private reserves down

to Komatipoort in Mozambique, and visited nature reserves in Swaziland and Northern KwaZulu-Natal.

"This rectangle is the largest area of wild rhinos in the world and it is under attack as never before," Holgate said.

Using simple A3 pieces of paper with the image of a rhino on it, he and his Rhino Art team have encouraged more than 120 000 children to voice their thoughts and feelings about the scourge of rhino poaching and the effect it is having in their communities.

Messages from young people living near the Kruger Park included: "We want to respect our rhinos like we respect Nelson Mandela" and "We need to ensure that our grandchildren's grandchildren can enjoy the rhino," Holgate said.

Dr Bandile Mkhize, of KZN Ezemvelo Wildlife, agreed, adding that KZN Ezemvelo Wildlife would be hosting an International Youth Rhino Summit on World Rhino Day (September 22) at Umfolozi in Zululand.
